It really was an uplifting day, and I would encourage you to attend next year's event in Durham on 6th September 2025.



## Revd Heller Gonzalez Spiritual Director writes...



#### **Mixed Emotions**

Preparation for a journey can be a double-edged sword. As I am writing I have been made aware of preparations going well underway for the upcoming Cursillo weekend at Carronvale, Larbert.

It brought to mind the excitement I used to feel as a child when my mother used to start, methodically, packing the cases a week before we went on summer holiday, the planting of bulbs preparing for an anticipated show of spring flowers, or the writing of invitations to a special party or wedding...

But there is another ingredient mixed into this excitement. That is, anxiety.

There is the anxiety that all will go well with the travel, that the place we go will be decent, that rabbits or foxes will not dig up the bulbs planted, that people will turn up to our party, that there will be enough food and drink. Yes, a double-edged sword, mixed emotions! A bit like going into a Cursillo weekend, a small course on the fundamental aspects of Christianity designed to help us, but we are anxious and not without a little fear.

It is not uncommon to see people arrive with questions and concerns, worried about what will happen and wondering why they are there. Mixed emotions. Anticipation coupled with anxiety, but the atmosphere is one of warmth, love and respect. There are talks, songs, laughter, small group discussions, breaks, moments of prayer, and a few surprises along the way (pleasant ones!). Before we know it, it is over.

Cursillo can be described but must be lived to be appreciated. Each of us perceives it through the different lenses of our life and faith experiences. We all see things differently. Even when we look at the same objects, we don't necessarily see them in the same way.

I was hesitant about going to Carronvale to Cursillo 68, but the three days retreat gave me the tools I needed to develop my discipleship, a renewed sense of faith and a different outlook on life.

If you have been thinking about discovering and developing your potential, being connected more fully with your faith community, or becoming more involved as an active member of your congregation, Cursillo may well be the answer you are looking for...

Why not give it a try?

I wish all our participants in Cursillo 71 a joyful and blessed Cursillo weekend.

The people who had travelled to be there were mainly Cursillistas, but also a few prospective participants for the upcoming Cursillo #71 from Dumbarton were there also.


There were praise items followed by a group reunion, after which Karen give a talk about 'What it is to be a servant', and how we fit in and work as a servant community. Karen highlighted 3 main points:

Vision, Passion & Purpose.

# Rev Canon ALEXANDER BLACK (1928 – 2024)

Following a short illness, Alex died peacefully, aged 95, on 7th March 2024. He leaves his wife of 66 years, Anne, their 3 sons, 2 grandsons and a stepgrandson. Alex was born in Glasgow in 1928 so was about 11 when war broke out and he was evacuated to the countryside on several occasions, including to 2 Episcopal Rectories (in Inverurie and Kilmarnock). He especially remembered them because each had 2 maids in service! Something he never achieved when he became a Rector!

He attended Glasgow University, and after National

Service with the Royal Navy, he returned to continue his studies at Edinburgh Theological College.

Alex started training under the guidance of the Dean of Argyle, George Douglas at the Cathedral of the Isles in Millport - which he would revisit often. His first curacy was a placement in Dumfries where he met Anne – he told us of the time they had a crash when cycling side by side near Sweetheart Abbey. Alex leaned across to sneak a quick kiss and they both fell onto the verge where they lay giggling. They eventually married in Dumfries in 1958 after which they moved to Glasgow where Alex served as a curate at the Cathedral until 1961. Then, St Marks, East Kilbride became his first charge.

In 1969 he moved to St Columba by the Castle, Edinburgh. Richard Holloway, a dear friend also from Glasgow, was in the next parish and was always available for support. Additionally, Alex spent his summer holidays as Chaplain on the National Trust for Scotland Cruises. Accompanied by Anne they would sail on the SS Uganda around Scandinavia.

Alex trained as a Marriage Guidance Counsellor and as a psychoanalyst to support his belief that his call included helping those struggling to cope. He then moved to St John's Princes Street, where he was part of the clergy team for four years.

In 1980 aged 51, whilst holidaying in Corfu, Alex suffered a heart attack. He was in hospital for 2 weeks with Anne nursing him in difficult conditions. He slowly made a good recovery

and in 1982 was appointed Rector of Holy Trinity Haddington and St Anne's Dunbar - quite different to his inner-city parishes!

Alex retired in 1993, and he and Anne settled in North Berwick. But Alex continued to help with ministerial duties in Dundee where they needed support and in Europe. He helped the Rector cover both St Baldred's and St Adrian's when required. Even into his 80's Alex was still being asked to officiate at funerals and marriages and he was always willing to assist if he could.


He later attended St Marks, Portobello with Rev Ruth Innes and Holy Trinity, Haddington with Rev Liz O'Ryan. He knew both Rectors through Cursillo. Alex & Anne had joined this renewal movement in the early 1990s with Mike Coates from Edinburgh a key supporter. By this time Richard Holloway, who was now Bishop of Edinburgh and Primus had welcomed Cursillo into Scotland. Alex became a regular member of Weekend teams. Sometimes on the clergy team but he was equally happy as a regular 'gopher'. He was much loved by all he met with his wonderful deep, rich voice, his caring worship and his childish sense of fun. Alex was later appointed Spiritual Director for Cursillo in Scotland.

Cursillo also introduced many holidays for them at Bishop's House, Iona. The company, the walks, services at the House and the Abbey all invoked a love for this holy island.

Throughout his life, Alex was a man of the church and its people. His faith was of vital importance to him. He built a wonderful Group Reunion in North Berwick who were regularly inspired by his thoughtful observations and advice. We miss him very much but reflect on the positive influence he had on us as pastor and friend.

Alex was a man of vast intellect and knowledge who, even on his last day was solving The Times Crossword. It was wonderful that at 95 his mind was still sharp as a tack. He lived a long, happy and rewarding life. A lifetime of dedicated service.

The esteem in which he was held perhaps shown with a turnout of 200 at his



Service of Thanksgiving along with many messages from those unable to travel.

May our dear friend now rest in peace.
